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UPDATE - New York Workforce Reduction Increased to 100%

March 22, 2020

Governor Cuomo signed has signed three Executive Orders (202-6, 202-7 and 202-8) (the "<u>Orders</u>"), that require employers in New York State to reduce their in-person workforce by **100%**, effective Sunday, March 22 at 8:00 p.m. There are limited exceptions to the workforce reduction rules for "essential businesses". The Orders are currently in effect through April 19, 2020.

Exceptions:

- The Orders continue to provide that businesses designated as "essential businesses" can maintain employment at "full capacity", despite the mandatory 100% workforce reduction. A list of those businesses is included at the end of this Alert.
- The scope of the original exceptions has been expanded to entities "*providing essential services* or functions whether to an essential business *or a non-essential business*".
 - Businesses in this new category may "operate at the level necessary to provide such service or function" not at full capacity the way "essential businesses" can.
 - This new category appears to allow *on-site* support for services such as logistics, mail and shipping, technology support for online services and general maintenance, even for non-essential businesses, although this is not entirely clear.
 - Further guidance is expected that could expand or narrow the new exception. A continued surge in reported COVID 19 cases may lead to greater restrictions.
 - In the interim, any request that employees report for work on-site, (*i.e.* not remotely) should be strictly limited to essential services. 1. Essential Health Care Operations, including

- research and laboratory services
- hospitals
- walk-in-care health facilities
- emergency veterinary and livestock services
- elder care
- medical wholesale and distribution
- home health care workers or aides for the elderly
- doctor and emergency dental
- nursing homes, or residential health care facilities or congregate care facilities
- medical supplies and equipment manufacturers and providers

2. Essential Infrastructure, including:

• utilities including power generation, fuel supply and transmission

- law enforcement

- building cleaners or janitors
- general maintenance whether employed by the entity directly or a vendor
- automotive repair
- disinfection

12. Vendors that Provide Essential Services or Products, Including Logistics and Technology Support, Child Care and Services:

- logistics
- technology support for online services
- child care programs and services
- government owned or leased buildings
- essential government services
